RE: Canadian Voice of Women for Peace call on the federal government to sign the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons and release a feminist foreign policy

Dear Prime Minister Trudeau and Minister Joly,

This past September 26th we celebrated the 8th International Day for the Total Elimination of Nuclear Weapons, which is more important than ever given the current heightened danger of a nuclear war. It is for this reason that the Canadian Voice of Women for Peace (VOW) is writing to urge you to sign and ratify the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons (TPNW). We are also raising our opposition to the planned F-35 procurement and our concern that this warplane will violate Canada's commitment to the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT).

The Doomsday Clock of the Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists shows that humanity is at 100 seconds to midnight, though that was set before the Russian invasion of Ukraine. The recent failure of the 10th review conference of the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons, making it the second failed review conference in a row, has resulted in a reliance on the 2010 review conference action plan. This is in stark contrast to the First Meeting of State Parties for the TPNW which successfully produced the Vienna Declaration and a 50-point Vienna Action Plan.

Today, there are 91 states are signatories and 68 states have ratified the TPNW each committing to not only aid in the universalization of the TPNW but also to aid those who have been impacted by nuclear weapons and testing, environmental remediation and for the inclusion and cooperation of stakeholders and scientists in the implementation of the action plan. In addition, it is the first international treaty on nuclear weapons to address gender and nuclear weapons. The TPNW aligns with Canada's purported commitment to a feminist foreign policy. As a feminist peace organization, VOW appeals to your government to become a state party.

We must consider the impacts that nuclear weapons have on both communities and the environment from production to dismantlement. In particular, they disproportionately and adversely affect Indigenous peoples with the location of testing, uranium mines and nuclear fuel dumping. Not to mention the devastation the detonation of any nuclear weapon would have on the environment, further exacerbating climate change. There are still 13, 000 nuclear weapons on the earth, and the use of any one of them would cause irreparable damage if not a nuclear war. The threat of nuclear weapons is an issue we cannot afford to ignore. VOW is calling on your government to sign and ratify the TPNW and show international leadership for disarmament.

Finally, we are concerned that the federal government's planned purchase of the F-35 heightens the nuclear risk and violates Canada's commitment to the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT). The F-35 is intended as a first-strike fighter jet and is a delivery system for nuclear weapons. Since its inception, the F-35 was designed to carry a nuclear weapon, the B61-12, in its bomb bay. The B61-12 is a 700-pound thermonuclear gravity bomb. It is a variable yield that ranges from 0.3 to 50 kilotons (kt). The bomb's maximum yield of 50-kilotons is the equivalent of 50,000 tons of TNT. This is more than twice the yield of the atomic bombs dropped on Hiroshima (18 kt TNT) and Nagasaki (19 kt TNT). Both the 2010 and the 2018 U.S. Nuclear Posture Reviews affirmed the central role that the F-35 plays in American and NATO nuclear weapons strategies. Thus, if Canada purchases the F-35, it could put our country in violation of the NPT that prohibits the transfer of nuclear weapons and requires progress on nuclear disarmament.

Would you please respond to our concerns about why Canada is not joining the TPNW and the nuclear risks of the F-35?
